FROM THE CAREER FIELD MANAGER

Greetings from the Pentagon! I hope this message finds you all well. The career field is alive and well and we continue to play a vital role in killing bad guys and breaking all of their stuff. In the first quarter of 2016 we expended over 7K weapons from various airframes to include the most recent to join the fight the good ole B-52. These results were accomplished with a career field manning inventory of 88%. That is a 1% growth from last year so things are starting to get a little better. The recent growth can be attributed to several efforts that have been put in place in order to help the aircraft armament career field.

Increased accessions have been one of the biggest factors. In FY16 the schoolhouse thru put will be over 700 accessions and that number will continue to grow for the next 3 years. Selective Reenlistment Bonus (SRB) was added for 2W1 Airmen in Zone A, 17 months to 6 years of service. This

comes out to the \$20K range depending on rank and number of years reenlisting. Special Duty Assignment Pay (SDAP) is being awarded to those in our nuclear units. Certified weapons loaders that are part of a nuclear mission get an additional \$150 per month. And finally, to help make up manpower shortages to support the F-35 we are contracting out 2W1's positions in non-combat coded Aircraft Maintenance Squadrons. This includes squadrons at Davis Monthan, Nellis, Luke and Elieson AFBs. So if you're itching to get back into loading there are opportunities available.

In April we completed the Utilization and Training Workshop (U&TW). It had been 3 years since we accomplished a U&TW so it was a very busy and productive week. Most of the work can be attributed to bringing on the F-35 and C-130J. Several tasks were added to the F-35 as it is maturing rapidly and our loaders are starting to perform more loading and maintenance tasks. A new section was created for the C-130J. In addition to the awesome firepower of the guns it will be capable of carrying Small Diameter Bombs and Hellfire's missiles.

Many other changes were made on legacy airframes and we also started an update to the Armament 9-level course. This course has received rave reviews from all attendees as well as many other maintenance career fields and we will continue to make it better.

A U&TW would not be complete without meeting with the instructors and students. Our armament instructors are fired up/motivated and are producing some outstanding students for the field. The same can be said for our students, fired up/motivated and ready to get to work. Only issue we had with either group was the CFM coin check. We have some work to do in that area...everyone has a damn cell phone but not a coin, go figure.

In closing I would like to announce the 2015 Kebil Scholarship award winners. This year we awarded \$5000 to 5 applicants: Carson Wilber, Johnathon Corriere, Kaytlyn Kooyers, Keyshawn Gatson, and Sara Rogalski. Congratulations to all of them and wish them the best while in pursuit of their educational goals. A call for new scholarship applications will be out soon and I encourage



everyone that is eligible to apply. Well that's enough from me. Looking forward to hopefully seeing everyone at Langley in July and until then stay safe and try and stay out of trouble!

Mentoring and job search

"We all need somebody to lean on"...as the song goes. Transitioning from the military into the civilian world is a time when friends come in handy, that is certain. Many of us are too proud to ask for help and/or sell our skills short of what we are capable. In this article, I want to tell my personal story, asking for help, and networking/marketing yourself. First, let me share my personal story.

My personal story just changed, some as I type this. I start my first day at work on Tuesday, 31 May, after 6 months of vacation, essentially. It wasn't much of a vacation though with trying to figure out where my family was headed. We did not want to stay in Louisiana (not a bad place, just not where we wanted to be) and wanted to move west. I found that looking for GS jobs outside of where you live is a bit more difficult to capture than if you are looking for work where you reside. I did interview for several GS jobs, both telephonically and inperson, but I feel that the jobs went to those "they" knew already. I ended my job search finally with a company called Schreiber Foods in Smithfield, Utah. The company has been awesome throughout the interview process, offered very decent pay, and they have great benefits. Job satisfaction, according to Glassdoor.com, is very high with this company while negative reviews seem to be more common on this website. I actually started looking at Schrieber Foods with a recruiting agency (Bradley-Morris) but the recruiter did not put my name forward. I saw the opening on Linked In later on and applied for the job myself. I really did get this job without the benefit of networking but I don't suggest this as a common job search method. It can be very frustrating and anxietyladen. Ask for help!



Whether it is reaching out to your fellow Chiefs or even some retired officers you worked for, don't be too proud to ask for help. I made some feeble attempts at networking because I was too stubborn to ask for help. I think Mike Lucchesi sensed my attempt for help and ultimately helped me wicker my resumes over the phone. Chad Ward sent me a copy of his awesome resume and that also helped. Thanks Mike and Chad. Although I did not do this well, I think that using your Linked In contacts by announcing that you are in the market is a very good way to go. People want to help, people like to help. Keep it simple...

There is a huge amount of information out there, from all the info in taught in TAP classes, to thousands of websites dedicated to job searches and mentoring.

Simply put, it can be overwhelming. I suggest to keep it simple. It is dependent on your personal path, but I would suggest using the following for job searches:

Linked In, USA Jobs, AACA, Glassdoor (reviewing the company and salaries), and maybe a recruiter, like Bradley-Morris (I don't endorse them, but they were pretty good.) I am also a member of several corporate mentoring groups, like Lockheed's, and while they put out some useful information (most of which you can get on Linked In), they really did not seem that motivated to



help get you a job. Again, keep it simple or you will just spin your wheels.

I am excited to start my next chapter of life and I hope that my new job is what I am looking for the near future. If I were to start my transition again, I would use my contacts better, keep it simple, and sell myself better in my resumes and Linked In profile. Good luck out there and Godspeed.

SrA Drew A Walden (Cannon AFB, NM)

SrA Drew Walden forward deployed in support of Operation Inherent Resolve, augmenting Electronic Warfare maintenance that supported 259 missions, 146 munitions/32K rounds released with a superior 99% release rate. He teamed with Special Programs Office on the \$4M Laser Small Diameter Bomb program, loading 12 munitions to support major milestone achievements. SrA Walden was hand picked for POTUS sanctioned mission, and he maintained a stellar 100& pass rate on 180 maintenance/loading operations after selected for Crew Chief position.

TSgt Brian Roback (Cannon AFB, NM)

TSgt Brian Roback forward deployed in support of Operation Inherent Resolve, his actions resulted in 485 munitions/54K rounds expended during 415 missions. 

462 History Part II

Previously we saw aero planes mature into what we recognize as fighters. The metamorphous of the plane from observation to a dedicated weapons platform meant a need for dedicated airplane weapons specialist. By 1917 the English word for these specialist was Armorer or what we now call mighty weapons loaders. Ok, I may have made the "mighty" part up. In my opinion the birth of the fighter is tied to the intentional mounting of the machinegun. But it wasn't only fighters that carried machineguns. Bombers did also for defensive purposes.

The bomber followed a similar evolution to fighters. Aerial observers realized if they could spot enemy troops and supplies they could toss out explosives

at them as well. The first air to ground ordinance was crude, hand grenades and modified mortars were used. Eventually it seemed cost effective to drop darts known



as flechettes, these proved ineffective. These could all be




tossed out by hand. As the war progressed and aircraft became more capable, bomb loads increased. And this meant bomb racks would have to be developed providing yet another thing for armorers to maintain. The racks



started out simple but increased in complexity as seen in the photos.





As the bombs got bigger bomb racks, naturally, had to keep pace. And the bombs got a lot bigger during the war. As we can see bombs evolved through the war to something recognizable by today's armament technicians. It was also so with bomb fuzes, something else our armorer forefathers would have to contended with






The mechanical fuzes that were invented for WWI are similar to the mechanical fuzes our Cold War generation grew up with. Anyone who's inserted a M-904 fuze would recognize the principle of their fuzes. The photos show the fuzing for the 25 lb Cooper bomb used by the allies.







Bullets and bombs were not the only thing the original armorers had to contend with. They loaded rockets as well. The photo shows rockets loaded for the intention of balloon busting. The balloons to be busted were, of course, dirigibles and observation balloons. The rockets proved inaccurate and were withdrawn in 1918 in favor of incendiary bullets. Yes, that's a 27th Aero Squadron SPAD XIII. Kiss my butt 94th FS!





As we can see, aircraft weapons systems came a long way during WWI. While much of the period covered didn't directly involve the USA, since we didn't enter the war till it's last year 1917, I find it relevant since the things learned and equipment developed eventually applied directly to American armerors. In fact, the aerial equipment we used was of European design. That would change in the coming decade. See you next time in the 1920s.

Acquisition Update CLEANING FLUID

That be Hydraulic Fluid (red oil)! Over the years we have heard and many witnessed the effects of dirty hydraulic fluid! The F-16 loves to pop the Delta-P switches anytime dirty or contaminated fluid is detected and the older the jets get the more often it seem to happen. F-15's too have experienced ill effects of dirty fluid in the systems.

You ask why am I wasting your time with all this Crew Chief and Specialist crap??? Well we too in Weapons have felt the effect of hydraulic fluid wearing O-rings and seals over the years - most often seen in one of the jammers "settling down or seeing some drift in the tilt, roll, or yaw". Many of us Fighter Guys seldom saw it; as the time we spent around the racks was normally fast enough it didn't make any difference. Maybe in the old days of Sliding Mavericks or some Aim-7 loads where

nothing lined up, we may have noticed a little movement. However, the Bomber Guys were the ones to most often point out they experience some "Drift" in one of the Bomber Bays!



The AGE guys would tear down the cylinders and most often find a bad seal or o-ring allowing the smallest amount of fluid to pass thus causing an "UnCommanded Movement" on the jammer!

Anyhow, we could and we did bitch about it a need for a fix - it wasn't until the Airframes started feeling the effect and Sorties were missed that anything other than changing fluid was done.

Today, all new Hydraulic Test Stands have on-board purification - it is automatic anytime the test stand is running! The process removes the particulates and any entrapped air while lowering the PPM (Parts Per Million) of water. Thus anytime the Mule is hooked to a aircraft "clean" or "cleaner" fluid is replacing the existing fluid. This process has to be repeated several times in order to call the aircraft "clean" - however, it has been reported even after only being hooked up one time it makes a difference.



So what does this do for us - it allows AGE to drain, flush and service our jammers and any other GSE with clean fluid. None of these improvements will solve world hunger overnight but continued use, we, as the Crew Chief did, will see a difference.

Lastly, there are and will be for many years "Old Mules." The new test stands have a hook up point to clean the old mules reservoirs and there are stand alone "Dual System Purifiers" (run off wall power 115V or an on-board Gen-Set being bought just to support the old stuff!




